It is packed with information you should know, but I will give you the bottom line up front: your club is in a strong financial position and membership continues to grow. While the SSA and many other clubs fret about how to attract members, Skyline has people practically beating down the door. We will try to remain agile in terms of accepting new members and trying to keep to optimum number of students in the pipeline.

The big news for our equipment is that John Noss and Shane Neitzey ferried the Pawnee up to Van Sant Airport in Pennsylvania for recovering of the fuselage and painting of the wings and all metal surfaces at Old School Aviation. Old School has been sending pictures of the work and it should look great when it is done.

It is a smaller piece of equipment, but I am also excited to have a second Gator for towing. Dave Collier spotted this one with low hours on the engine and for a good price and the board decided to snap it up. Bruce Zivik has volunteered to breakout the saws and PVC glue and make another Surrey top for the new Gator. Efforts will be made to make the new top different enough to be identified at a distance. We will keep the ATV for the possibility of towing out of a soggy field after a landout.

As many of you know, we have tried to come up with some names for the Gators to distinguish the two nearly identical machines. Unfortunately, the logistics were too much to meet the deadline for this newsletter.

After significant work on the ASK-21 and Grob last year, this year the Sprite is receiving some attention as Pete Maynard and Bill Vickland are replacing the fabric on the rudder.

As I briefed the assembled members at the annual meeting, a new hangar at Front Royal is coming closer to reality. The airport commission has decided to dismantle the metalskinned "pole barn" hangars and replace them with a larger, open hangar more friendly to glider operations. The project appears to have traction with the Warren County Board of Supervisors and the airport commission should see approval to proceed from the county in late February or early March. In other airport news, we should see a construction road cut through off of Stokes Airport Road so that the contractor hired to remove the trees on the south side of the field can access them and haul them away. Additionally, the rehabilitation of the stone house is coming along and Reggie expects to move back there in a month or so.

Our next pre-season event is the mandatory Safety Meeting the 25th of February. We hope to have this meeting at the Warren County High School cafeteria. The library meeting room was already booked. Look for confirmation and directions soon. The meeting is required attendance. We know that some folks will not be able to attend for important reasons. If you cannot attend you are required to review the slides and inform Chuck Stover, the Safety Officer before you do anything at the field. This includes flying and standing your duty. As we traditionally do, there will be a hangar sweep out and flying will start directly after the meeting.

See you at the Safety Meeting. Until then, stay warm! Cheers, Dan






And, we'll need a new Cirrus meister. Happy soaring,—*Curtis Wheeler*





2017 Petersburg Wave Camp-New information

As advertised just after Christmas, there will be a wave camp in Petersburg, West Virginia this Spring sponsored by Stahl Flying Services (the Grant County FBO) and supported by Shenandoah Valley Soaring with towing and ground support.

The terrain around Petersburg produces some of the best wave in the region and the airport is perfectly situated for entry into the wave. A wave window to 23,000 feet MSL exists.

The camp will include more educational information about wave, wave weather and also try to have more social events this year. Larry Stahl would also like to have some advance registration for planning purposes.

Please Note-The Dates of the Wave Camp had to be changed because of many conflicts. The New Dates are Friday, March 24, 2017 thru Sunday, April 2, 2017.

All items are arranged so that their USB ports are facing up, and could theoretically be charged while still in the box.
